

# Program Wrap: Tour of Woodlawn Cemetery

Thanks to all who participated in our tour of Woodlawn Cemetery. It was a picture-perfect autumn afternoon, and the Woodlawn grounds were absolutely beautiful. Our tour guide pointed out many of the famous, notable, and interesting New Yorkers buried there, including Irving Berlin, Duke Ellington, F.W. Woolworth, J.C. Penney, Robert Moses, Fiorello La Guardia, Joseph Pulitzer, and many more. We even toured a vacant mausoleum on sale for a cool \$3 million, as well as the elaborate architectural gem belonging to the Belmont Family. Thank you to Dee van Eyck for a truly rewarding and enriching afternoon.



## Internship Program

For the past several years, the LHS has had an internship program with Mamaroneck High School, in which two students participate in research into local history. Last year, our interns researched the Quaker cemetery in Larchmont Village. This is a project for interns to continue to document. We have plans to honor this land, but we need to finish the research before continuing. There is a rumor that the Underground Railroad, which helped slaves escape to freedom in Canada, may be

linked to the Quaker cemetery and some houses in Larchmont. This is a popular topic to explore.

Since the inception of the internship program, past trustees Bruce Allen, Ed Jacobson, and Jan Northrup, as well as archivist Sandy Tashoff, mentored the interns. This year, however, we lack an intern coordinator, and we are looking for someone to meet this need. Requirements include working with Mamaroneck High School in selecting one or two interns, and then meeting with the intern(s) in the Archives weekly to get started on a

project and carry it out. In the past, interns have received a stipend of \$250 a semester, and the program has been beneficial both to the students and to the Society. If you enjoy working with young people and can commit a few hours a week to this project, please contact Barbara Newman (newman@thorn.net) as soon as possible to discuss the upcoming spring semester. And if you know a high school student who would be interested in the internship, ask her or him to contact Barbara, as well.


